Acts of Compassion - Day by Day

Lent is a time to acknowledge the crosses of others, even while we carry our own.

In the midst of his own agony, Jesus' interaction with the thief on the cross is one of mercy and compassion.

Consider this story:

A young man had been arrested for stealing from the royal palace twice. Sentenced to hang, the boy's mother sought mercy from Napoleon on behalf of her son. Napoleon answered the mother's plea, "This boy has stolen from my palace twice now; he deserves justice and that justice is death." The mother replied, "But I don't ask for justice, your highness. I seek mercy." "He does not deserve mercy," replied Napoleon. The mother passionately begged, "It would not be mercy if he deserved it." Touched by the mother's grief and passion, Napoleon consented and released the boy.

At some point we need to acknowledge that we are not worthy of God's love. It is pure gift, offered freely.

At the beginning of our Lenten journey, you were invited to gaze upon yourself the way God does - in love and compassion. The Passion invites us to gaze upon ourselves again in the light of the 'God who bends low in reckless love.' God's love for us is big love how do we embrace that more fully in our lives as we prepare to enter the Easter season?

- What do we need to die to?
- What do we need to leave behind in the tomb?
- What do we need to commend to God?

Joseph of Arimathea was moved to be gracious and compassionate towards Jesus, even in death. He was a member of the council and yet stood aside to take a step towards Jesus. He also gave something that had cost him and that in his own way he desired.

- What can we offer to Jesus who gives everything for us?
- How can we be the face of God to others around us?

"If we truly believe that all is Christ, would we continue to crucify Christ? Or would we act according to the law of Jesus: love, mercy & compassion? Would we be willing to lay down our lives out of love for the sake of the other? If we truly believed that Christ is centre of the universe, would we be so private about the good news we hold so sacred?"

EASTER ALTAR ART-QUILT

In 2010 my husband Robert and I were travelling with our caravan, while staying in Alice Springs we drove out to the West MacDonnell Ranges to a number of tourist sites. The first place we wanted to see was Standley Chasm and were advised the best time of day was late morning when the sun hit the rocks. We took our time walking all the way into the Chasm as the rocks, stones and plants on the way in were lovely also. We waited till the sun hit the Chasm walls and it was worth the wait it was absolutely amazing so brilliantly bright that the sky in the photos I took looked white, the Chasm walls golden yellow and bright red. The Chasm is often referred to as a Cathedral. Robert and I both really liked it, then when Robert died, I used one of the photos I took for a small prayer memorial card for him, my daughter in-law Kate suspended a small thin cross onto the photo for me, this is my inspiration for the Altar art-quilt.

Standley Chasm called Angkerle by the Aborigines was named in honour of Mrs. Ida Standley, she was the first European school teacher in Alice Springs in 1914. In 1925 the school moved to Jay Creek near the Chasm, she was the first non-aboriginal woman to visit the Chasm, that is why it's called after her.

The white fabric used for the sky has tiny butterflies embellished on it (sign of new life).

The Cross is bright gold the Lord shining his light on us and bright for the Resurrection there is some brown showing through on the cross signifying he died on a wooden cross.

Golden yellow walls also showing Gods bright light is always there for us, the red walls the blood he shed for us, the rough rocks at the bottom of the cross represent Jesus's and our journey through life isn't always smooth.

I used aboriginal print fabric for the foliage in the foreground because the Chasm is owned and run by Aboriginal women, the red in the fabric could be drops of Jesus blood.

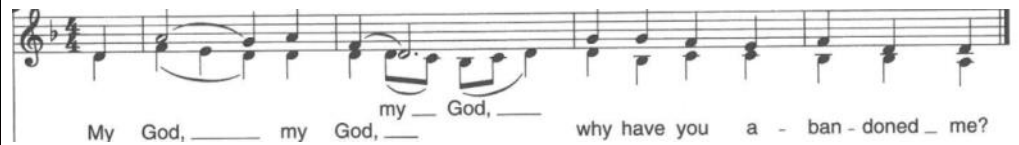
I used raw edge applique and collage fabric technique and quilted it with free machine stitching and I loved making it. (Pamela McIntosh)

Project Compassion Stories— NGUYET—VIETNAM

Nguyet is a teenager living with a disability in a small town in Vietnam. She lived the first 14 years of her life isolated at home.

Her disability restricted her movements and any chance of going to school. Around 7% of people in Vietnam are living with a disability. They often have poorer health, fewer education and employment opportunities and higher poverty rates.

The future appeared bleak for Nguyet, until a Caritas Australia program, implemented by our partner Catholic Relief Services (CRS), changed her life forever.

Around 4,000 people have now benefitted from this inspiring Caritas program. The program is helping people like Nguyet, by focusing on inclusive education, health services and building strong community networks to help to break down stigma and discrimination for those with disabilities and their families.

Two years after she featured in Project Compassion 2017, Nguyet has built a successful online business selling t-shirts, accessories and home-cooked snacks made by her sister.

She is also more confident in communicating with people – and is riding a motorbike she bought from her profits. “I can go out independently now,” Nguyet says. “I would like to have my own shop in the village one day. And I hope that other people with disabilities in Vietnam will receive help like I did.”

Nguyet has great hope and a real commitment to succeed in her future. She hopes her story will inspire others to see what is possible for a person once isolated and unheard.

We pray for our sisters and brothers around the world who face discrimination and are prevented from reaching their full potential. We pray that basic rights and respect for all peoples may be established and become effective in all nations and states.



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
