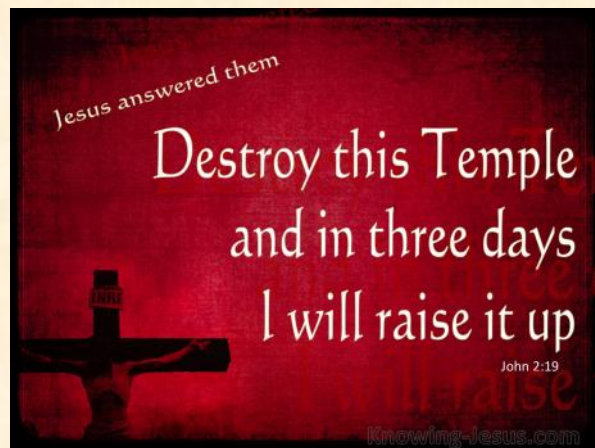

CONGRATULATIONS

The celebration of 50 years of marriage commitment to one another is a source of blessing for their family, friends and our parish community.



Today, we dedicate ourselves anew to keeping God's commandments, as we celebrate the mystery of God's love for us, shown through the wisdom and power of Christ.

Having rescued his people from slavery, God gives them the Ten Commandments. These offer guidance for liberation and right-living, rather than oppression and burden (**First Reading**).

The **Gospel**, however, indicates that many have not remained faithful to God's commandments. In their greed they have turned God's house into a marketplace. As Jesus ejects the buyers and sellers, we are reminded that salvation will come about through the death and resurrection of Christ, the true temple of the Divine.

The **Psalm** is a hymn to the life-giving qualities of God's Law. It shows the precepts and commands of God himself: God's own essence.

Paul reflects on Jesus's death, which is interpreted by many as a sign of weakness or foolishness. But it is in fact a demonstration to the world of God's power and wisdom. (**Second Reading**).

This week, we pray to hear the Word of God afresh in our own being. As we try to offer the Word hospitality and space to take root within us, we ask with the psalmist that it might 'revive the soul'. We also pray for the freedom of our brothers and sisters throughout the world who are victims of modern-day slavery.

UPDATED COVID-19 DIOCESAN PROTOCOLS

If you are feeling unwell, have a cough or cold, sore throat or flu like symptoms please do not attend our physical gatherings as this puts others as well as yourself at risk.

After having your name registered or ticked off please use the hand sanitiser located at the four entrance points of the church at the beginning of our liturgical celebration and as you leave the church building.

Communion will begin with those on the car park side and then move to those seated on the Swan Street side. Please allow space between each recipient.

If the people attending a religious service will be singing in an indoor area then a max capacity of one person per 4 square metre rule applies and everyone attending the service must wear a face mask during the singing.

Therefore, until this regulation changes we will not engage in congregational singing.

However, up to 30 people may participate in an indoor choir in accordance with social distancing protocols.

Council of Priests

Under the stewardship of Bishop Mark Edwards the Council of Priests has been re-established.

Initially, one priest from each deanery was chosen by vote from those priests resident in that deanery.

Then a priest from each of the given age groups in years of ordination was chosen. All priests of diocese were eligible to vote in this category.

Paddy Sykes, Rick Micallef and Brad Rafter were elected.

The Council of Priests including its ex-officio members: Bishop Mark Edwards, Fr Kevin O'Reilly (Chancellor), Fr Joel Wallace (Vicar General) and elected members: Fr Peter Murphy, Fr Reece Beltrame, Fr Henry Ibe, Fr Paddy Sykes, Fr Rick Micallef, Fr Brad Rafter also at the Bishop's instruction constitute the Diocesan College of Consultors to assist him with the governance of the diocese.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 2: 13-25

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up'. The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about anyone; he could tell what a person had in them. The Gospel of the Lord.
