Plenary Council

During the last week the Fifth Plenary Council of the Australian Catholic Church assembled for the first time. Getting to this point has been a long process that began three & a half years ago. We now seem to live in a different country, in a different age. Its planning and initial stages began before the bushfires, before coronavirus, before the restrictions and lockdowns that have been part of our daily lives. It was conceived as a process that would bring people together personally in their local churches and finally in large gatherings. Its final stage come when people cannot gather to celebrate Mass in much of Australia and the members of the Council will meet electronically.

In the face of so much change it is helpful to remind ourselves of what the Council is about and what we might hope for from it. Pastoral councils are held from time to time in the Church to discuss issues of national importance for the Church. This is the first to be held in Australia since 1937. Their structure was regulated at a time when it was conceived as a gathering of Bishops, but it takes place when Pope Francis has pressed for Church governance in which all Catholics are involved. In this Council only Bishops will vote on its decisions and clergy and Religious form the majority of the Council members. Despite these limitations, the preparations for the Council tried to involve as many Catholics as possible at parish level, in naming the main issues facing the Church today, giving feedback in the preparation of material for the Council discussions. Lay people from each diocese will be among the members of the Council.

This complex process began with a simple question: "What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?" The question is deliberately broad: it can be asked of the internal life of the Church as it is expressed in our liturgy, teaching, parish and diocesan organisation and decision making. It can also be asked, as Pope Francis has emphasised, about the relationship of the Church to the wider society in our outreach to people who are not Catholic or marginalised by society, and in our contribution to public life and conversation.

At the Council, the members will have the benefit of the feedback from people in its earlier stages. They will be expected to take account not only of what we have said but of the passion with which we have brought to particular issues.

What might we hope that the Council will deliver? Pope Francis has recently spoken much of his own hopes. He is more concerned with good process than with good conclusions. He does not see the Council as a parliamentary meeting in which positions are debated and decided by vote. He sees them as exercises in listening in which all present are taken beyond their initial convictions. People may continue to differ but they will have recognised deeper truths behind the difference. In this respect we all will be listening for the voice of the Spirit.

That process puts much emphasis on reflective prayer. This does not mean saying more prayers but making more space for reflection on what people have heard and said and on our own inner response. We do not stop at the point of agreement or disagreement but keep listening to what is being said beyond the

Letter from the Bishop of Wagga Wagga

6 October 2021 Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

According to the NSW roadmap for the whole of state re-opening, during the fortnight from Monday 11 October until Monday 25 October only the fully vaccinated are permitted to enter churches. (Monday 11 October is the Monday after 70% of the eligible population is fully vaccinated and Monday 25 October is the Monday after 80% will be completely vaccinated.)

I direct that the Diocese, the Parishes and the clergy in the diocese follow the NSW government public health orders. After receiving advice, I have decided that it is too onerous to ask parishes to monitor and implement compliance in respect to vaccination status. Also, the Church, the sacrament of communion, should not be separating people as they come to Mass. Further, excluding some Catholics from worship has the potential to cause long lasting upset and division. Thus, given the brief duration of this regulation, I have taken the grave and sad decision to direct that in the Diocese of Wagga Wagga there will be no public or 'private' Masses with a congregation taking place and that our churches will close between Monday 11 October and Sunday 24 October inclusive.

For similar reasons, our chapels of adoration will also close. Our churches can be opened for funerals and weddings and these will follow the Public Health Orders. From Monday 25 October, our Churches are again open to our entire community and regular Masses and other services will resume.

As a way of celebrating our unity in Christ, on Sunday 17 October and again on Sunday 24 October, in the diocese there will be one live-streamed Mass from the Cathedral at 9am on YouTube at <https://youtu.be/vFxmX1ui16A> I invite you to join me for these Masses. This is an opportunity to celebrate our union as the pilgrim people who have their eyes fixed on the Lord. We will be explicitly the one body of Christ and remain united in this time of tension. This is an opportunity. Let us pray these Masses as the one Church of the Diocese of Wagga Wagga.

I encourage those who are hesitant about receiving a vaccine to see their family doctor to discuss receiving it. Your doctor will give advice that is appropriate for you. Your priests and I will be offering Mass for you during this time. In Jesus Christ and Mary Immaculate. *Bishop Mark Edwards*
