In the First Reading, this weekend, the prophet Jeremiah speaks of a God who gathers his people to heal them. The Psalm sings of these and other wonderful works: 'The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy'. The author of the letter to the Hebrews (Second Reading) shows that the high priest is one called by God to deal gently with the people, because he himself knows weakness. And in the Gospel, Jesus calls Bartimaeus, a blind beggar of Jericho, to him into discipleship. Though blind, Bartimaeus already has insight into who Jesus is and, when he hears him pass by, shouts in desperation even when told to be quiet. For Bartimaeus, Jesus is now 'Master', and his relationship with him brings healing and new life.

Let's pray, this week, that we might recognise the great things the Lord works for us, and that our hope lies in God, who calls to us through our weaknesses and limitations.

From the Bishop's Office

Murrumbidgee Local Health District has issued a Public Health Alert with over 120 active cases in the Albury LGA.

A significant amount of current cases are among those aged 12 to 24. **It is critical those aged 12 and above come forward for vaccination. Vaccination is proven to prevent serious illness of COVID-19 and lower the risk of transmission.** The outbreak at Mercy Place continues to grow with at least 14 cases diagnosed and the death of two residents. Mercy Place is closed to all visitors as they try to get the outbreak under control. Your prayers for the residents and staff of Mercy Place would be greatly appreciated while they endure this terrible situation.

Travel to and from the region is discouraged. Anyone currently experiencing or who has recently experienced even mild cold-like symptoms is asked to come forward immediately for testing. It's important that you isolate after your test until you get a negative result.

Updated COVID-19 Diocesan Protocols

If you are feeling unwell, have a cough or cold, sore throat or flu like symptoms please do not attend our physical gatherings as this puts others as well as yourself at risk. Our Sunday 9.30am celebration of the Eucharist continues to be live streamed.

Plenary Council Report on the First General Assembly October, 2021

In a spirit of prayer and discernment, the First General Assembly of the Plenary Council provided responses/proposals to the 16 questions generated by the agenda and the consideration of the fruits of the listening and dialogue phase. These submissions, put forward by ten (10) small groups, included reference to:

Ecological conversion
healing wounds of abuse
learning from our First Nations People's
meeting the needs of the most vulnerable
equipping us for mission
prayer and liturgy
formation of priests and lay leaders
Parish structures
Church governance
Catholic Education
Catholic agencies and Ministries

Despite the challenges of gathering in a "virtual" environment, the celebration of the First General Assembly achieved a positive step forward in "The Journey So Far" of reform and renewal of the Catholic Church in Australia.

On a personal note, it was an extraordinary opportunity to listen deeply and to discern the movement of the Holy Spirit and to engage in spiritual conversations centred on the future of Catholic Education. It was especially uplifting participating for 2 days of the assembly with other members of the Plenary Council from our Wagga Wagga Diocese, including Bishop Mark Edwards, Fr Joel Wallace and Fr Peter Thompson.

The collective submissions will now be the subject of continuing reflection by the members of the Plenary Council and consultation with the wider Church community as we develop propositions for presentation to the Second Assembly of the Council next July in Sydney. This will be coordinated with Australian preparations for the 2023 Synod: *For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission*. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.'

So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
