

Reflection on the Readings

In the first reading from Genesis God tells Abram "fear not Abram, I am your shield"... and Abram put his faith in the Lord. Sarah and Abraham had a child. A promise was made and fulfilled...and the fulfillment of this promise changed the history of salvation.

In our Gospel today, another couple receives a promise and that promised is also fulfilled. Mary and Joseph bring their child to the Temple for they were obedient and followed the law of Moses: "Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord." They didn't have the resources to offer a lamb, so they offered "the sacrifice of a pair of turtle doves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord. The promise made to the righteous and devout Simeon and the prophetess Anna were also fulfilled! Simeon will not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord... He received more than what was promised! Not only did he see the consolation of Israel, not only did he see the Christ, but he took him into his arms and blessed God!! Now he can die in peace, for his eyes saw God's salvation! A promise was made to Mary: a sword shall pierce her heart... and the promised was later fulfilled.

TO PONDER:

We often call today's feast an "idea" feast, for it can be a deeply challenging one to integrate into the diverse reality of what "family" is today. Our readings clearly recognise that the experience of any family life is not utopian. The readings themselves are rooted in historical contexts of suffering and struggle in family as well as community. And they do not promise familial joy, as we see with the prophecy made to Mary that a sword will "pierce" her as a mother. Yet these readings do contain inspiration and consolation. They tell us that we are not alone in experiencing life's brokenness, but they simultaneously call us to continue to work toward the ideals of love and unity, beginning with what is at the core of our daily lives: our families.

Liturgy of the Word

First reading: Book of Genesis

The word of the Lord was spoken to Abram in a vision, 'Have no fear, Abram, I am your shield; your reward will be very great.' 'My Lord,' Abram replied 'what do you intend to give me? I go childless...' Then Abram said, 'See, you have given me no descendants; some man of my household will be my heir.' And then this word of the Lord was spoken to him, 'He shall not be your heir; your heir shall be of your own flesh and blood.' Then taking him outside he said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants' he told him. Abram put his faith n the Lord, who counted this as making him justified. The Lord dealt kindly with Sarah as he had said and did what he had promised her. So Sarah conceived and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the time God had promised. Abraham named the son born to him Isaac, the son to whom Sarah had given birth.

The word of the Lord

Responsorial Psalm 104

(When the Psalm is sung, the words will vary slightly but the meaning remains the same.)

Response: The Lord remembers his covenant for ever

Give thanks to the Lord, tell his name, Make known his deeds among the peoples. O sing to him, sing his praise; tell all his wonderful works! R

Be proud of his holy name, Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice. Consider the Lord and his strength; constantly seek his face. R

Remember the wonders he has done, Hi miracles, the judgments he spoke. O children of Abraham, his servant, O sons of the Jacob he chose. R

He remembers his covenant for ever, his promise for a thousand generations, the covenant he made with Abraham, the oath he swore to Isaac. R

A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants and that he set out without knowing where he was going. It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore. It was by faith that Abraham when put to the test offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

The word of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia!

In the past God spoke to our fathers through the prophets;

now he speaks to us through his Son. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 2: 22-40 (Shortened version)

When the day came for them to be purified, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. ... Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him...Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus he took him into his arms and blessed God and he said: 'Now, Master you can let your servant go in peace, just as you promised; because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see, a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel.'... When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required they went back to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity and he was filled with wisdom and God's favour was with him.
