

In the First Reading, Jonah takes the word of God to the people in Nineveh. They hear it, are inspired to change their evil ways, and God shows them his mercy. God's love and forgiveness are at the heart of the Psalm, as we pray for better understanding of the ways in which the Lord invites us to live our lives.

St Paul issues a challenge to the Christian community in Corinth in this week's Second Reading. At the centre of this, though, is an encouragement to us to free our minds and hearts from reliance on the things of this world, and to place our hope in the reign of God. The Gospel speaks of the opening of the hearts and minds of the first apostles as they leave behind everything they know in order to follow Jesus.

This week, perhaps I can give myself the gift of a little extra time with scripture. I pray that the Lord will open my mind and heart, so I can see more clearly where my path with him lies.

Gather us together to look after this land, so that the beauty of our mother earth may be preserved for all future generations.


Jesus our brother, give us your grace,

Parish News

TO PONDER:

In Deuteronomy, Moses describes the prophetic role as born from the peoples' desire not to "hear the voice of the Lord" or see God's "great fire". Direct contact with God is so awesome, so overpowering, that it may cause death (Deut 18:16). The prophet therefore mediates the divine through a human body, absorbing some of the power and softening the contact. Yet the prophetic message is God's message. It can be overpowering. It can burn like a great fire in all directions indicting each of us, all of us, seeking to speak through us - even as its source and goal is divine love. When have you experienced God through the mediation of a prophet? When have you experienced God's direct, burning love?

In Mark, the unclean spirit asks Jesus, "What have you to do with us?" The answer is clear in Mark: Jesus is out to destroy evil. Yet the unclean spirit's question is a good one to ponder. What does Jesus's prophetic message—his acts of teaching, healing and rebuke—have to do with us?" The only way to truly discern the answer is to live a life oriented toward listening to God—a life "without distraction," according to Paul. The responsorial psalm states, "if today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts" (Ps 95:8). Our readings call us to keep our hearts soft and our ears open to the divine messages working through us and around us, messages which seek to heal, unite and help us adhere or cling to God.

Liturgy of the Word

First Reading: Book of Deuteronomy

Moses said to the people: 'Your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, 'All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods that prophet shall die.' The word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm 94

(When the Psalm is sung, the words will vary slightly but the meaning remains the same).

Response: If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

Come, ring out our joy to the Lord; hail the rock who saves us. Let us come before him, giving thanks, with songs let us hail the Lord. R

Come in; let us kneel and bend low; Let us kneel before the God who made us for he is our God and we the people who belong to his pasture, the flock that is led by his hand. R

O that today you would listen to his voice! 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as on that day at Massah in the desert, when your fathers put me to the test; when they tried me, though they saw my work.' R

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife; he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia!

A people in darkness have seen a great light; A radiant dawn shines on those lost in death. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 1: 21-28

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum and as soon as the sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new and with what authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilea countryside.
