

This weekend's readings conclude the feast of Christmas and begin the new season of Ordinary Time.

In the First Reading we hear the Lord's dramatic call of Samuel and how Samuel fails to hear and discern it properly at first. The young Samuel might well have grown up praying with words like those in today's Psalm. We easily imagine him, in the Temple offering a prayer of commitment to follow the Lord's will. In the Second Reading St Paul writing to the Church of Corinth, reminds the people that their bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. All that they have and all that they are is gift, a gift purchased at great price.

The Gospel continues the story of Jesus' Baptism. John the Baptist, having recognised Jesus as the Lamb of God points two of his own followers to Jesus.

The scripture texts of this weekend's liturgy depict stories of call and response.

During the coming week let's ponder God's call in our own lives and reflect both on the level of our attentiveness and on the depth of our response.


We offer our prayers believing that God's presence and power can do more than we can ever know. Amen

# **Parish News**

#### **TO PONDER:**

Jesus asks, "What are you looking for?" The disciples' strange question-response reveals their desire: to "stay" with him, to abide with him. Our readings today are about this desire for intimacy and physical nearness to God, which is the basis of discipleship. In our first reading Samuel is inside the Literal structure of the temple when he is called, right beside the ark (similar to our tabernacle in Catholicism). He does not yet know God, yet his heart is thoroughly open and predisposed to respond. According to Paul, the miracle is that our bodies are literal temples through which we experience God's indwelling. Our readings call us to this desire for intimacy with God—to contemplative prayer, to the meeting of God within us. How would you respond if Jesus were to ask you, "What are you looking for?"

#### R.I.P. Norma Lawlor

Norma Lawlor died last week at the age of 93. During my time at Finley she was the church sacristan, a ministry she carried out during the tenure of Paul Hart and Leo Wright before that.

During my eighteen years in Finley, Norma not only set up for mass, but purloined and arranged fresh flowers each week, cleaned the sacred vessels, washed and ironed the linen and liturgical garments, hand made baptismal stoles. In addition to this she cooked magnificent meals and cleaned the presbytery meticulously (avoiding my many piles of paperwork). Most importantly, she took communion to the sick and homebound and visited the local nursing home each week.

Affectionately known as 'the queen', a term never to be used in her presence—she characterises that generation we are never likely to see again.

The last time I visited her at home in late November she had been up since sunrise, prayed, washed the car by hand, picked and froze fresh beans, dug the vegie patch made fresh biscuits, packed a box of assorted homemade goodies, set the table with fine china cups for my arrival. Of course she was a formidable woman, no shrinking violet. Nevertheless, she was a faithful woman of prayer and a true servant of the church who came to accept the idiosyncrasies of the many priests she encountered.

Re-united with her beloved husband Joe, may she rest in peace since her many good deeds go with her.

# **Liturgy of the Word**

### First reading: First Book of Samuel

Samuel! was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord where the ark of God was when the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' He answered. 'Here I am.' Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called. 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called, the third time. He got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy and he said to Samuel, 'Go and lie down and if someone calls say, 'Speak Lord, your servant is listening.' So Samuel went and lay down in his place. The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered 'Speak Lord, your servant is listening.' Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.
