ANZAC Day - Reflection and Prayer

Martin Flanagan, the Australian writer and historian says that when he is asked to talk to young Australians about World War I he gets one third of them to stand in a group. To them he says 'You're the ones who came back with your lives and bodies intact'.

To the other two thirds he says 'You're the ones who were either killed or maimed or wounded'.

Australia's first battalion landed on the shores of Gallipoli in the dark of the early morning 25 April 1915. From that original 1st battalion of 800, casualties by 1918 would total 715 - almost the whole unit.

Our commemoration of ANZAC Day always falls during the Christian feast of Easter. It was early morning and still dark when those first disciples saddened and grieving reached the tomb - but what they expected to find - the dead, lifeless body of Jesus was not there.

May the crucified yet risen Christ point to a way of living which alleviates suffering, promotes healing and forgiveness and rejects the madness of war.

May the Christian and ANZAC principles of integrity, compassion, courage and committed self giving love continue to shape the direction of our personal and communal lives.

God of love and liberty, we thank you for the peace and security we enjoy.

It was won for us through the courage and devotion of those who gave their lives in time of war.

We pray that their labour and sacrifice may not be in vain, but that their spirit may live on in us and in generations to come.

We ask this prayer in the name of Jesus and in the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

TO PONDER:

1 John and the Gospel reiterate the need to "remain" in Christ. The Gospel employs familiar imagery from the Hebrew Bible of the vine grower (God and the vineyard (Israel) to describe God's persistence and love for Israel (see Isa 5:1-7; Jer 2:21). In the Gospel, Jesus calls himself the "true" vine in relation to God the vine-grower, while his followers are the branches. To participate in this dynamic, three-part union, we are to "remain" in Christ by obeying the commandments, at the heart of which are faith and love in action. By remaining in Christ, we will be pruned, we will produce fruit, and ultimately, we will glorify God. What does "remaining" in Christ mean tangibly, in our daily lives?

Saul's conversion involves a dramatic, bold response to Christ. The disciples are initially wary of this transformation. Their hesitance is an invitation to consider our own reactions to the "Sauls" in our world, and whether we believe transformation is possible in our lives, our families, and our societies. This promise—and the challenge—is that with God's help and our participation, anything is possible, for anyone.


PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL
