Our parish bible study group continues every second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 7.00pm in the parish hall.


Reflection Twelfth Sunday of the Year

This weekend's readings provide an opportunity to focus on our trust in God with great courage and hope. Three of the texts demonstrate the Lord's power over the sea, and his care for us. In the First Reading, the Lord responds to Job's complaints that he has been punished unjustly. God speaks of his divine power over his own creation.

God's control over nature is also echoed in the Gospel, as Jesus calms the storm. The disciples panic as the gale takes hold, awakening Jesus, who chides them for their lack of faith. They are filled with awe as Jesus stills the waves, asking: 'Who can this be?'

The Psalmist tells of the sailors' fear as their frail boats are buffeted by the winds and waves, but they give thanks to the Lord for his loving care as he leads them to a safe haven. St Paul expresses his gratitude for the overwhelming love of Christ, through whose life, death and resurrection we are offered a new creation. (Second Reading)

This week we might pray for an increasing awareness of the Lord's constant presence in our lives. We can express our gratitude for his love in the words of the psalm refrain: O give thanks to the Lord, for his love endures for ever.

Parish News

TO PONDER:

Our readings invite reorientations of perspective. In Job, God comes out of the whirlwind to shift Job from a *self-centered* to a *God-centered* perspective. Paul speaks of becoming a "new creation" in Christ, of having his view transformed to view all creation not from a human view, but from that of Christ crucified and raised. Jesus draws his disciples across the sea to be similarly transformed by witnessing Jesus's power. These readings ask us to consider our own perspectives. Are we also open to transformation, awe and wonder?

Why good people suffer is perhaps the most haunting question of human existence. The power of the book of Job is that it refutes any trite or superficial response to this question. Job is finally comforted not because he receives an answer, but because he experiences God. The disciples, like Job, are exposed to a great squall or whirlwind until they experience Jesus's power over it. Our texts do not shy away from the realities of this life: suffering, terror, death. Nor do they suggest that pain is understandable. But they do promise that God is present in and through suffering, even if we do not feel God or experience that presence.
