Today's readings celebrate the nearness of the Lord to us. Created through God and for God, we are drawn ever closer by peace and reconciliation. Not only that. We are also called to become like the Lord in our service to all.

The **First Reading** commands us to love, and gives us the means to do it. The law, or word, is not beyond our reach but is as close to us as our hearts. We continue to pray for the peace of the world, and for all who suffer as a result of conflict and violent attack.

Luke 10:25-37

TO PONDER:

In our Gospel reading, Jesus does not answer the scholar's question directly. Instead, he returns the question, asking, "How do you read it?" In other words, what does the scholar think he must do to "inherit" or choose life? He clearly knows that choosing life means following the Torah's call to love God and neighbour, yet there is dissonance between his head-knowledge and his heart-knowledge. As you pray with the Gospel, imagine the interaction between Jesus and the scholar. Put yourself in the scholar's shoes. Now turn the question on yourself: what does it mean to you to inherit or choose life now? How does this choice manifest in your actions?

St Vincent de Paul Winter Appeal—Update

St Vincent De Paul's Care and Support Centre have been overwhelmed by the generosity of our Parish in responding to their appeal for donations of quality blankets, doonas, bed linen, towels, sleeping bags; as well as cash donations. These will make a big difference to the lives of those suffering financial insecurity and inadequate housing.

They've also received and started distributing donations of knitted beanies using quantities of wool that were provided as part of the Appeal.

Vinnies especially commend the efforts of our young people, specifically Xavier Catholic College students for their massive contribution as part of our Blanket Drive. Xavier's massive contribution will mean Vinnies can share with their fellow Care & Support Centre in Albury, as well as other Vinnies Centres in our district – places like Corowa, Holbrook, Jerilderie. The Border Mail ran a story about these incredibly community minded Xavier Catholic College students on Tuesday 8 July 2027. The article also cited the rising numbers of homeless persons in our community – a conservative estimate. Also, the need for recruiting more volunteers to the Vinnies Care & Support Centre in North Albury.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 10:25-37

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.' But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said 'and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have.' Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one, who took pity on him,' he replied.
