To Ponder

Today's feast day links revelation with light. In Isaiah, God's glory radiates over and through Jerusalem, and the Holy City becomes a manifestation of God's "shining radiance." In the Gospel, the star in the night guides foreigners as they travel to worship Jesus. These readings use light to underscore the meaning of today's feast of the Epiphany, a word that means both "radiance" and "manifestation" (from the Greek *epiphaneia*). Today, we celebrate God's manifestation and radiance through Christ as both a historical event and a continuous act. The feast day is one of celebration, but it is also a signal to stop and pay attention to where and through whom God manifests today. It is also a reminder that today we are called to be God's light, God's revelation in the dark spaces.

To Ponder

Epiphany signifies unity through Christ. Our readings describe the expansion and inclusion of God's revelation to all people as one diverse body. In Ephesians, unity is the deepest "mystery" of God's revelation, and Jews and Gentiles are depicted as coheirs, co-partners and co-body members. In Matthew, the first people to recognise Jesus are foreigners, travellers who have come from afar to revere him. Similarly, in Isaiah, all people travel to Jerusalem to revere God. In our deeply divided world, unity is a radical concept. It is also the call and challenge of Epiphany as God's true desire for us. As we near the end of the Christmas season, are you ready to commit to this Epiphany.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians

You have probably heard how I have been entrusted by God with the grace he meant for you, and that it was by a revelation that I was given the knowledge of the mystery. This mystery that has now been revealed through the Spirit to his holy apostles and prophets was unknown to any in past generations; it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body and that the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

This is the Word of the Lord.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 2:1-12

After Jesus had been born in Bethlehem in Judea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant, king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judea,' they told him 'for this is what the prophet wrote: And you, Bethlehem in the land of Judah you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.' Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star appeared and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod and returned to their own country by a different way.
